# SB503: Breakfast After the Bell



# 2016-2017 School Year Progress Report

The following data shows progress in grant applications and awards and implementation in the 2016-2017 school year. In the previous school year, only schools who had 70 percent or greater free and reduced eligibility school-wide and had not previously implemented breakfast after the bell were eligible for grant funds. In the 2016-2017 school year, all schools with 70 percent or greater free and reduced eligibility school-wide were eligible for grants fund and grants were awarded on a competitive basis.

### **SUCCESS AUGUST 2016 - PRESENT**

- + 98 schools were awarded \$988,027 in grant awards, increasing access to breakfast for more than 101,566 students statewide.
- + 243 schools across eight school districts and two state-sponsored charter schools were eliqible for grant funds.
- + 169 applications for funding were received, requesting a total of \$2,394,355. All seven school districts or state-sponsored charter schools that applied received some funding.
- + Increased access to breakfast in high-need schools is important because extensive research has shown that students who eat breakfast succeed academically, have fewer behavioral issues and fewer visits to the school nurse.

# Personnel Supplies utensils, laptops, trash receptacles

The large amount of personnel funding requested is due to the increased implementation of breakfast in the classroom and other labor-intensive means of serving breakfast after the bell.

### 2016-2017 BREAKFAST PARTICIPATION GOALS



Middle schools receiving SB503 grant funds have a goal of 40% participation.

High schools receiving SB503 grant funds have a goal of **35% participation**.


## 2015-2016 School Year Final Report

Senate Bill 503, also known as the Breakfast After the Bell Bill, was signed into law by Governor Brian Sandoval on June 12, 2015. The bill required all Nevada schools with 70 percent or greater free/reduced lunch eligibility implement an option for students to have access to breakfast after the start of the school day. The bill also set aside \$2 million in grant money to assist in implementation over two years. The following data shows participation success, progress in grant applications, awards and implementation in the 2015-2016 school year.

### 2015-2016 SUCCESS

- + 109 schools (of 111) in all eight eligible districts received \$1 million in grant awards, increasing access to breakfast for more than 84,000 students statewide.
- **+** 3,618,093 more breakfasts served compared to 2014-2015.
- → Double breakfast participation (from 20% to 44%) among qualifying schools over the same time in the 2014-2015 school year.
- + Additional \$8 million in all federal breakfast reimbursements into the state of Nevada
- ➡ Increased access to breakfast in high-need schools is important because extensive research has shown that students who eat breakfast succeed academically, have fewer behavioral issues and fewer visits to the school nurse.
